The Year 12 curriculum is designed to give students a taste of working in the exciting and vibrant Performing Arts Industry. It will equip students with the knowledge and skills to successfully complete the Level 3 BTEC Certificate in Performing Arts. Students will use theory and applied skills to create a more sophisticated and collaborative theatrical offering. Learning will be through a mixture of practical workshops, theory based lessons and independent research study.

A personal evaluation of the work is important; judgements need to be based on effective research and secure critical analysis.
